WARINA ROYTMAN, MD, FACP UCSF, FRESNO 2024 NCSCG PRESIDENT

As an academic clinician, I am often in the position of counseling the medical students, residents and fellows about their career options and choices. The two most important things that influence one's career choice and trajectory are mentorship and finding "your people". This was and continues to be the case for me. I completed my post-graduate training at Mount Sinai in NYC, one of the largest liver transplant programs in the country. By the end of my training, which was generously supplemented by moonlighting on the liver transplant service, I met many of my amazing mentors and certainly felt that I found "my people" among the hepatologists.

I moved to Hawaii, which I considered home, after completing my training. Hawaii is a unique place to practice medicine in general and hepatology in particular. It is a melting pot of cultures, cuisines and approaches to health and disease. I was fortunate to meet and work with Dr. Naoky Tsai who was and continues to be my mentor. After a decade in Hawaii, and after completing a medical education fellowship at the University of Hawaii, I wanted to explore a more academically focused career.

I joined UCSF Fresno in 2017 with the goal of expanding my involvement in medical education, jumpstarting the clinical hepatology program and continuing my research involvement. My previous practice setting in Hawaii was in the well-established liver center under a watchful eye of my wonderful mentor. None of those advantages existed in Fresno. I suddenly found myself in the position of being the hepatology expert for UCSF Fresno without the benefit of being able to run things by my mentor. I spent a few anxious weeks and months getting used to my new role and a fair amount of time on the phone with Dr. Tsai.

As I became more comfortable in my new role, I noticed vast differences in patients and diseases that I saw in Fresno compared to Hawaii or even further back in New York. I found the number of patients presenting with advanced liver disease striking. Patients with unrecognized steatotic liver disease (MASLD, MetALD and alcohol associated liver disease) and patients with undiagnosed and/or untreated chronic hepatitis B and C particularly stood out for me. There are a number of explanations for it including chronic shortage of physicians, pervasive poverty, food deserts, genetic predisposition to liver disease and more recently societal disruptions of COVID-19 leading to increased alcohol consumption. While I was not able to fix societal reasons for liver disease, I felt that I could make a difference in educating the community about it. This is how the Annual UCSF Fresno Liver Expo was born. The first event was held in March of 2019 and proved to be so popular that we repeated it October of 2019 in honor of the national liver disease awareness month.







In October of 2024 we held our 6th annual Liver Expo. It is an all-day event that includes lectures on liver health, exercise boot camp, heathy cooking (and eating) demonstration as well as free FibroScan testing and free point of care testing for hepatitis C. Over the years the didactic portions of the Expo covered topics ranging from viral hepatitis, to alcohol associated liver disease, to steatotic liver disease and liver transplantation. We have been fortunate to have the world experts from the institutions from northern California share their wisdom on these topics with ever growing number of attendees. GI fellows, internal medicine residents and advanced care providers are on hand to counsel the patients on the results of the tests. Research coordinators are present as well to provide information about clinical trials for liver disease available at UCSF Fresno. Attendees love the opportunity to learn about the health of liver, interact informally with the physicians and other providers and get free testing. The residents and fellows feel that they were making a real difference in the health of their community. The event continued to grow every year attracting several hundred participants and many sponsors. There has been a number of patients that have been diagnosed with fatty liver disease and have made lifestyle changes to reverse it. The popularity of the event continues to grow by word of mouth.



Outside of UCSF Fresno, I found "my people" at the NCSCG. Over the years, I enjoyed attending, planning and speaking at the multiple NCSCG events as well as meeting new colleagues and friends from across Northern California. I am humbled by the honor of serving at the president of the NCSCG this year and look forward to a successful year for our society.
